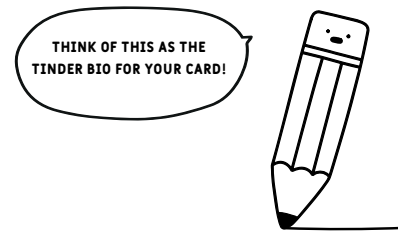
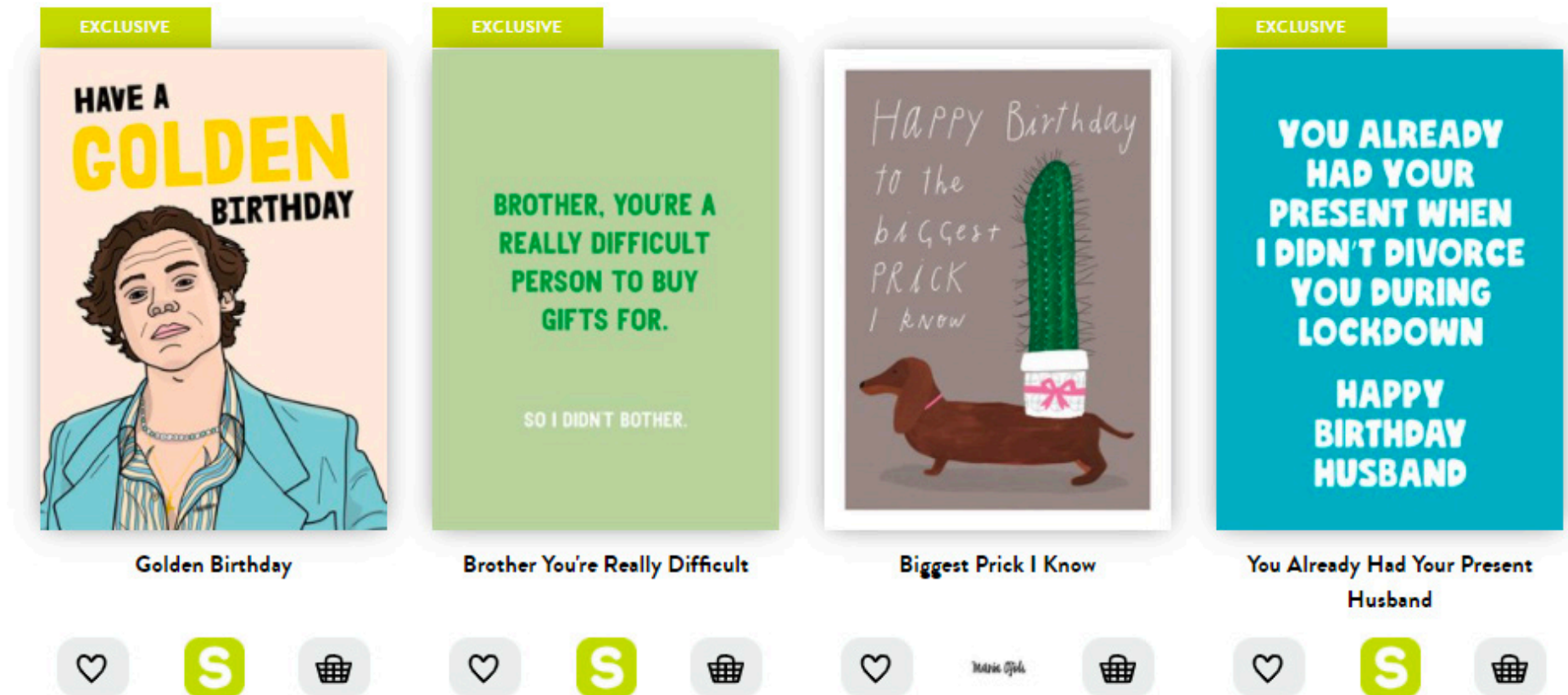



WELCOME TO THE WORLD OF CARD DESCRIPTIONS



This Guide covers titles and descriptions for the card uploading process.

When coming up with a title for your card try to be specific to your design, as this will help people to find your card. In addition to this, you must capitalise the first letter of each word, for examples see below.

Writing descriptions for the cards you are uploading is a pretty important step in helping customers find and select your cards for their order. When writing your descriptions, you need to bear a few things in mind: your name, the occasion of the card, the recipient, its theme and any other keywords that would help with searchability (how easily customer can find your cards).

Scribbler is known for its humour and if you can make it funny then all the better! As is standard practice for the content writers here at Scribbler, we suggest you start off with a funny tagline or pun followed by your designer name and the occasion, as well as relating to the general theme of the card.

Sometimes you'll have more of a generic card, that might not have a specific relation or occasion. That's fine, but don't forget to add your name in and try to relate to what's on the card as best as you can.
